Frost is a frequent clinician and adjudicator at regional and national events. Frost's high school performing groups have garnered many gold and silver medals in international competitions and have received invitations from all over the world to participate in special events. Dr. Kevin Ford

Joseph Kevin Ford was born in Chickamauga, Georgia. While at Florida State University he studied conducting with Rodney Eichenberger and served as his assistant conductor for two years. Dr. Ford has continued his conducting training through workshops with Robert Shaw, Roger Wagner, Dale Warland, Frederic Fennel, and Arnold Gabriel.
